Introduction to Spiritual Song

The African-American spiritual has long been a favorite form of Christian music in the United States. From the 1700s to the present day, worshipers have delighted in the use of spirituals for the purpose of musical prayer, praise, and thanksgiving. The history and evolution of these songs is a story that encompasses the life and times of the African slaves brought to this country; their emancipation after the Civil War; and their subsequent struggle for civil rights.


The spiritual may be considered religious folk art as in its pure form it is not composed by an individual but grew out the collective experience of a group of people, and passed along orally. Composed arrangements for choirs, instruments, and soloists have been made available to the world thanks to the creative powers of such African-Americans as the following: John W. Work, William Dawson, W. T. Burleigh, Moses Hogan, Hall Johnson, J. Jefferson Cleveland, and Lena McLin.

Our purpose here today is to walk through the church year using appropriate spirituals for each season. We celebrate the great flexibility of these songs and their timeless effectiveness as vehicles to express our human condition before God. As a part of the Black History Month 2025, we honor the contributions of the African-Americans that gave the spiritual to Christendom.

ADVENT SEASON – Advent, the first season of the Christian year, proclaims both comings of Christ, not only his Nativity, but also his coming in final Victory!



CHRISTMAS SEASON - Christmas is the celebration of the birth of Christ.



EPIPHANY - Epiphany celebrates the coming of the Magi to bring gifts to the Child Jesus. The emphasis of this time is the revelation of Christ to the Gentiles.





Baptism of the Lord – This Sunday marks the baptism of Jesus in the Jordan River by his cousin, John the Baptist. Often churches include a baptismal remembrance as part of their worship this day.



Transfiguration Sunday – The last Sunday before Lent recalls Christ's transfiguration on the mountain with Elijah and Moses.



THE LENTEN SEASON - Lent covers forty days before Easter, minus Sundays, which are "feast days." The time is symbolic of Jesus' forty days in the wilderness being tempted.

Ash Wednesday - The First Day of Lent. On this day all the faithful according to ancient custom are exhorted to approach the altar, and there the clergy, dipping their thumb into ashes, marks the forehead





Ascension of the Lord - The elevation of Christ into heaven by His own power in presence of His disciples the fortieth day after His Resurrection.




PENTECOST - This day is the last day of the Easter Season. It is recognized as the day believers received the gift of the Holy Spirit.



All Saints Day – November 1st, this day calls to remembrance those servants of God who died in the Faith.



ENFIELD UCC GUN POLICY

Gun violence continues to exist in the United States as a public health issue, one that requires reform in policy and culture. Enfield UCC is a gun-free zone, and no one may bring a firearm on the premises unless explicitly authorized by the pastor and/or moderator.

The United Church of Christ is a proponent of gun safety and gun control and supports policies including:

- strengthen the licensing and registration of handgun transfers
- restrict firearm possession by persons convicted of violent crimes and by juveniles
- limit handgun purchases to one per month
- strengthen regulation of gun dealers
- increase civil and criminal liability for misuse of firearms
- prohibit semiautomatic assault weapons, Saturday night specials, explosive ammunition and large capacity magazines
- require gun safety devices
- require training in the safe use of firearms as a condition of licensing

We encourage everyone to be in touch with legislators, urging them to pass legislation that restricts the sale of firearms.
